 members there and helping NSW to win both the Xanthorrhoea Trophy (relays) and
 the Long distance shield.
- 7 of the 20 strong NSW Schools team were WHO members (Lachlan, Savanna, Matilda, Marcus, Shay, Justine, Tiffany). This team competed at the Aus Schools Champs in Brisbane, with some great results.
- WHO once again came 2nd in the NSW Interclub challenge and remain the 3rd largest club in NSW.

Treasurer's Report

This report covers the full year period 1st October, 2024 to 31st September, 2025.

1. Event Summary

During the year there were 12 events. Financial details for each event are shown in the accompanying Annual Event Report 2024-2025. Highlights include:

- Over 1610 entries across 12 events
- Minor event income for 2024/25 events totalled \$10,381. Which was \$1,200 higher than for the 2023/24 events. We ran 2 MapRun events for the first time.
- We ran 2 major event, the Xmas 5 Day event at Pennant Hills High School and KBIII event at Kahli's Rock. Income from major events totalled \$6,762.

2. Financial Results

The Income and Expenditure Report and the Balance Sheet are attached. Key highlights are:

- Available starting funds as of 1st October 2024 were \$25,198. At the end of the period, total funds were \$30,480.
- Club member development was assisted with a total of \$2,050.
- ONSW sanctioning fees were the greatest expense item at a total of \$7,353.
- The club purchased a new computer and new control flags.
- WHO clothing was purchased resulting in a subsidy to club members' of \$437
- In summary WHO finances remain very healthy.

Division 6 - We are joint winners along with Bennelong (both sides achieving 3 out of 4 wins for the season) - a pretty outstanding effort given that our team largely consisted of juniors who started the year relatively new to orienteering. Well done to all Div 6 team members including Hamilton Kinneally, Elliott McQuillan, Janet Morris, Blake Read, Toby Said, Nathan Cheung, Levi Said, and Yvonne Fillery.

Honourable mention to our Div 1 team who, while not quite able to replicate last year's massive achievement of holding up the Frank Assenza trophy, were nonetheless highly competitive all season, coming second on the ladder with 3 wins out of 5 rounds. Just not quite enough to tip over Garingal who took out the crown.

Kudos also to our Div 2 team who also finished the year second on the ladder - with 3 out of 4 wins. Again, highly competitive all season, just not quite enough to get there against SHOO-IKO.

Mapping Officer's Report

WHO has approximately 50 current master maps, many with more than one event area. Looking at current event series, we have 24 possible SSS maps. This year we added Holroyd Gardens. For interest, over the last 14 years the most frequently used SSS maps were Watsons Bay, Brush Farm, the Sanctuary and Vineyard Creek.

We have 8 possible Metro maps. The old Cecil Hills RP map is being brought up to date for a Metro as it now has facilities for an assembly at the Wylde Bike Park.

For State League, we have two large areas at Roseberg SF and Mt Piper and a small area at Wyangala Waters. There is potential at Wyangala for more maps (using parts of the old Giant map) such as the north end of the lake.

t would be good to have more bush maps for SL and Metro and some areas have been visited at Rylstone, Cattai NP and Glenbrook to check for current suitability.

We continue to lend local maps to SOS for their events which might encourage participation in local areas.

a) WHO Club Championships 2025

This is the ninth year that "Participation and Performance" statistics have been used to decide the WHO Championship.

This year 89 members entered 1 to 59 events.

Over 228639 points were distributed to the 1484 eligible entries.

Ages ranged from 5+ to 80+ and there was a good mix of male and female participants.

This year I severely weighted some of the participants but note that their names are still near the top of the results.

I am still concerned that many members results were affected by officiating or assisting activities at events but, to date, have not been able to establish suitable compensation.
